
A Huge Thank You For The Shoebox Appeal

Thank You from the charity Young Lives vs Cancer



As Winter sets in and the festive season approaches I wanted to send best wishes and thanks to 'you and Thank you for your yours'. continued support over the school year and your most recent donation of £93.22 (from the Charity Walk in the summer), bringing donations to an amazing £1858.72 this year. It is a huge amount and could provide over 30 nights accommodation at Paul's House to enable families to stay together during child's cancer treatment. I wanted to give you an update on the year:

Children and young people with cancer, and their families, are facing a winter without the magic that many of us hope for. Instead of making precious memories with their families, treatment means that they're facing weeks spent many miles from home.

But your support changes everything. During the last 12 months:

We supported 6,849 children, young people and their families to cope with the challenges of a cancer diagnosis.

- We provided 23,892 nights of accommodation to 633 families at our Homes from Home free places to stay close to principal treatment centres that help families avoid the extra financial burdens of travel, accommodation and food costs.
- We also distributed 5,057 grants worth over £840,879.

Our welfare advice line received over 2,000 enquiries and provided an estimated £1,082,813 in financial gain to families seeking help and support.

Every day in the UK, 12 children and young people are diagnosed with cancer. From the moment of diagnosis, families face the overwhelming challenge of navigating complex systems to secure basic support. For these children, cancer's impact extends beyond medical treatment, especially during special times like Christmas.

Young Lives vs Cancer is unique in providing specialist care for children and young people facing cancer.

The students have all worked incredibly well and from the group we have four main businesses:

- Infinity Cube: Selling homemade 3D printed fidget cubes
- Crafts & Co: Selling hand made bits and bobs.





The Autumn term has been even busier this year with more than 90 fixtures/events/in-house sports being played with an array of results across district, regional and national competitions. There have been opportunities for all to get involved in the extra curriculum clubs offered as well as a variety of competitive sports including football, rugby, netball, cross country, indoor athletics, swimming and basketball. Football

ESFA & ESSEX CUPS

Year 7 Boys and U13 Girls progressed the furthest in the English Schooling (ESFA) competition reaching Round 3 with the boys losing very narrowly to Eastbury (1-0 after extra time) at the end of November; the girls score of 5-

More positive news is that we still have three teams still in the Essex Cup competitions including our U13 and U16 girls who have played some tough opposition to reach the third round, and the Year 11 Boys who are fast approaching the quarter finals. We are hoping the new year continues their winning ways to the latter stages for all three teams.

DISTRICT FOOTBALL

We are on schedule for the district games despite the wet weather we have experienced during the latter half of the Autumn term, having played West Hatch, Ongar Academy and Epping St John with more wins than losses. We are hoping that this trend continues and we have representation from all the age groups, Year 7 through to Year 11, making the district finals scheduled for late April/ early May.

U19 SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES ESSEX LEAGUE

The U19 college team have managed to play all their fixtures so far with a mixture of results leaving them in sixth place in their Division, they, unfortunately, didn't progress in the League Cup this year so we are hoping they find more consistency for their remaining games to give them a chance of being in the play offs at the end of the season.

INTERHOUSE FOOTBALL

We launch the academic year with the Interhouse football competition running every evening during the first week of the term. As expected, the Year 7 students had no problem in recruiting sufficient pupils with in excess of 45 trying to take the first honour of the year for their House.

It was a very close competition between Gillingham and Whitechapel with the eventual winners going to Gillingham who beat Whitechapel 2-1 in the final match. Well done to Gillingham a great display of technical ball skills, also need to mention Whitechapel who came in second place who fought valiantly to the end, and Salisbury who finished in 3rd place drawing one and losing one.

Year 8 & Year 9 replicated the Year 7 result with Gillingham taking the top spot with two wins, Whitechapel second place with one win and a loss and Salisbury 3rd place.

Rugby

This year there has been a significant increase in the number of Rugby games for the various age groups as we have played in the Essex County Festivals throughout the Autumn term. In addition, the teams have played the qualifying and, in some cases, final stages of the West Essex and Harlow District championships.

Competing in the County competitions has given the boys the opportunity to play at a higher level which has definitely shown an improved in all the teams. Year 11 were the first to start the County competitions and came away winning one game, drawing one game and losing one game — they did much better than expected especially as it was so early in their training

program.

Interhouse Rugby

The results from the interhouse rugby competition saw all three houses being top at the various age groups: Salisbury were outright winners in Year 7, Whitechapel took pole position in Year 8, Whitechapel repeated their success in Year 9 as well, and Year 10/11 combined was Gillingham. The Year 7 and Year 10/11 combined had the highest participation numbers both having more than 45 pupils taking part. Year 8 and Year 9 struggled to get full teams for each of the houses but those that did turn up worked hard in all the games showing some good rugby along the way.

Cross Country

The first cross country competition took place at Lee valley Golf Course on the 18th September and was a brilliant warm up for the English schools in October. It was also a good opportunity for the Year 7 competitors to get a flavour of what a large-scale cross- country event was like. The star of the show was definitely H.Stockill who won the Senior boys event although some younger participants showed their potential, namely D. Osinibi and I.Machine who both finished in 7th place in the Junior (Year 7) boys race.

The English Schools (ESAA) qualifying round took place on the 11th October with some excellent results. The intermediate Boys finished in a respectable 6th place which was mirrored by the Girl's intermediate team. The Junior girls fared slightly better finishing in 4th place. The outstanding results were that both the Junior Boys and the Senior Boys qualified for the next round, Regional Finals. This event occurred early November hosted by Felsted School, and, although the boys teams did really well both finishing in 4th place, they narrowly missed out on getting a place in the National finals as only the top three teams qualified.

The English Schools Cross Country wasn't the only event we experienced success in during this term, sixty plus pupils took part in the District Cross Country finals held at Ashton Playing Fields on the 6th December. The West Essex & Harlow District Cross Country results showed that Davenant retained the overall title for a fifth consecutive year and remain District champions for 2024/2025. A special mention needs to go to all the Year 11 participants who sat their Maths Mock exam first thing in the morning and then were transported by Mrs Winch at 10:50am, literally arriving just in time for their race, and then went on to win their age group. This highlights the commitment, hard work and ability of the pupils at Davenant and the support of staff other than PE. Miss Ball congratulates everyone for a job well done and says that the PE team will look at ways that we can continue to improve so that Davenant can defend the title next year and beyond!

These two Houses took the top spot for Year 9 although it was Gillingham for the boys and Salisbury for the girls and again it was Gillingham for the boys Year 10/11 and Salisbury for Year 10/11 girls.



Indoor Athletics

The Year 10/11 combined teams took part in the Indoor Schools Championships in October and finished in a respectable 9th place for the Boys and 10th place for the girls. The Year 8/9 combined teams were markedly more successful in their event first qualifying for the semi-finals and then making it to the B final where the Boys and Girls A teams finished in 2nd and 3rd places consecutively. It is worth mentioning that the boys missed out on the A final by 1 point!!! Further, there were many outstanding performances in the finals with a number of the Davenant teams just missing out on setting new records especially in the Boys sprints. The Year 7 Indoor Championships start in February so the PE team are beginning to get them ready by offering some of the disciplines as part of the Spring extra curriculum clubs.

Basketball

Three teams, Year 7, 8, and U16, have all played in the district qualifiers over the past two months. Despite the difficulties they did have two players of the tournament (those wearing the medals) namely K. Barrow and G. Pover. The Year 8 teams did remarkedly well

with the first team winning 5 out of 6 games and the second team winning 4, drawing 1 and only losing 1. They have definitely made it to the final competition and their two players of the tournament (those wearing the medals) were H. Wimpress and N. Kirwan-Louis. The U16 team managed to play their qualifier without losing a game so will definitely make the final stages scheduled to be played in February 2025.



Lessons are timetabled during the school day. Lessons are usually on the same day of the week but times are rotated so that students do not miss too much of the same subject. The lesson time and day will be posted on their Google Classroom and is printed on a timetable outside the Music Office every FRIDAY for the following week. It is vital that students check these. Changes to the timetable MUST be requested by 11am the following MONDAY morning.

Lesson times are occasionally subject to change due to events outside our control (sporting events/ assessments/room changes/teacher absence or schedules/other school events) so we advise students always to double check on the morning of the lesson. We will do all we can to make sure changes are communicated in good time and if a change is particularly short notice we may go and collect your child from their class to ensure they make their lesson.

If you need to change the lesson time booked (for example due to Dentist/Doctor appointments/ Exams/assessments/family issues) you must give 48 hours' notice otherwise the lesson is still charged and not rescheduled. If you need to change a lesson and give sufficient notice we will endeavour to reschedule for the same day or add as a catch up lesson later in the term.

More information is available on the school website PERFORMING ARTS/Tuition and there are two documents on Talaxy covering the details.

If your child has school tuition it is mandatory that they join a school ensemble. Obviously those who learn outside school are more than welcome too!






World of Work Conference 2024

Online Safety

Online safety is as important as ever in the lead up to the festive season with technology and gadgets high on the wish list for many young people this Christmas. The Essex Safeguarding Children Board (ESCB) are reminding parents and carers that if their child does receive a new device or games consoles for Christmas, it's important to set them up correctly to keep children safe when online - the parental controls installed on previous devices may need checking and setting up again.

Any child is at risk of being exploited - both boys and girls can be groomed online, with contact often starting on social media. It is important to remember that exploitation is not the child's fault, and they are never to blame.

Caregivers can create a supportive environment, where online safety is discussed regularly in the same way as road safety or stranger danger, enabling children to speak up about any concerns they may have. By taking an interest in what games they are playing and trying to understand their online world, parents and carers can initiate important conversations.

The <u>ESCB online safety webpages</u> have resources for parents, carers and professionals including podcasts, videos, how to report concerns, and information about spotting the signs of exploitation.

Concerns about child exploitation can be reported anonymously via Crimestoppers 0800 555111. There is also a dedicated Essex Police Child Exploitation hotline - for parents, carers and members of the public to seek advice around concerns they may have about their own or other children with regards to criminal and sexual exploitation: 01245 452058.



What Parents & Educators Need to Know about MENTAL HEALTH & WELLBEING APPS

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? When looking at options for supporting a child's mental health, the sheer volume can be overwhelming. There are many wellbeing apps available, but unfortunately not all are trustworthy. It's important to evaluate which resources are suitable, reliable and effective. This guide lets you know what to consider before installing such an app, to determine just how useful it's going to be.

QUALITY & RELIABILITY

Mental health appe can be a useful starting point when looking for wellbeing advice and strategies and can be a useful extension to the in-person services available. However, they aren't a substitute. Information on the quality of some of these apps is scarce. They may look outs and child-rhealthy, but have they been designed by a mental health professional? Furthermore, do they have research to back up their content?

PLACE RESPONSIBILITY ON CHILDREN

Some apps add the words 'kide' or 'children' to their title or use carboen icoss to make them more appealing to young people. When signing up for some of these apps, some will speak to the parent directly, saying something along the lines of 'Your child is good to go, Let them take it from here'. It's important to remain involved in the child's mental health journey, so regular absolute in the child's mental health journey, so regular

DISREGARDING APPROPRIATE SUPPORT

Young people who test anxious and have trouble steeping may download a mindfulness app to help. While this is a good strategy initially, it's not addressing the root of the problem. A child could simply try managing these symptoms themselves (as opposed to speaking out and seeking professional help), which could

LACK OF PERSONALISATION

Mental health or wellbeing sape are useful tools for the short term, took hing users several health with the first term took hing users several health habits to manage their condition — such as keeping an illness effery, improving nutrition and practising mindfulness exercises. As every person is unique—and children especially will grow and develop in different ways—these apps struggle to tailor themselves to users' individual needs. For example, many apps don't distinguish between the ages of users and can distinguish between the ages of users and can

DATA SECURITY

As with any other app — not just those for mental health and wellbeing — It's wise to check out the privacy policy heafore downloading it. Some of these applications may share data with third parties for numerous reasons (such as targeted advertisements), and it a user is sharing personal and sensitive information within the app. they probably don't want it

IN-APP PURCHASES

Many apps will provide their most basic features for free but will require you to pay for other aspects – such as a more tailored experience or access to additional resources. This could be a nee -off fee or a regular subscription. Consider whether this is actually required, is it benefiting the child, or could they receive the same support from a medical professional?

Advice for Parents & Educators

CHECK THE CREDIBILITY OF THE APP

Before you download a mental health and wellbeing app, Investigate the developers. Have they consulted with qualified mental health professionals to create their resource? Also check whether the app is affiliated with any government or mental health organisations, as these are solid indicators of legitimacy. Reviews can also be a useful signost to the app's quality. There are many good apps out there, but there are just as many that miss the mark.

READ THE PRIVACY POLICY

Look into the app's terms of service — especially its privacy policy.

Do so by yourself first, then go over it with the child who is considering using the app, to ensure they know what data will be collected and how exectly it will be used. Use all of this information to make an educatized decision on whether or not to download that particular raps.

SEEK PROFESSIONAL SUPPORT

Prusted mental health and wellbeing appe designed by qualified, reputable arganizations can be used alongside the personalised advice and support of fully trained personalism. These apps should never be considered a substitute for counselling or other tailored medical help. If you have real concerns about a child's mental wellbeing, you should seek appropriate advice from a suitable source, such as their OP - or Childlins, who can be contacted by calling 0800 TITI.

ENCOURAGE OPEN COMMUNICATION

Mental health and welibeing apps can be useful for writing down feelings, tracking your own health and other such activities. These can help if the problem is short-term and temperarry - such is a child getting stressed about approaching exams - or if you're currently waiting for professional support. Nonetheless, it is important that children aren't safely reliant on the app and have a safe space to talk about their feelings and experiences in the real world.






