Lessons start week beginning 15th SEPTEMBER 2025 for next term.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION TO NOTE:

Lessons are timetabled during the school day. Lessons are usually on the same day of the week but times are rotated so that students do not miss too much of the same subject. The lesson time and day will be posted on their Google Classroom and is printed on a timetable outside the Music Office every FRIDAY for the following week. It is vital that students check these. Changes to the timetable MUST be requested by 11am MONDAY morning.

Lesson times are occasionally subject to change due to events outside our control (sporting events/assessments/room changes/teacher absence or schedules/other school events) so we advise students always to double check on the morning of the lesson. We will do all we can to make sure changes are communicated in good time and if a change is particularly short notice we may go and collect your child from their class to ensure they make their lesson.

If you need to change the lesson time booked (for example due to Dentist/Doctor appointments/Exams/assessments/family issues) you must give 48 hours' notice otherwise the lesson is still charged and not rescheduled. If you need to change a lesson and give sufficient notice we will endeavour to reschedule for the same day or add as a catch up lesson later in the term.

If your child has school tuition it is mandatory that they join a school musical ensemble – a band or a choir. Obviously those who learn outside school are more than welcome too!

Queries that are most important will be answered first as it is the busiest time of the year for our department. The music office will be closed to queries after the 17th July 2025 until 1st September 2025.



Summer Concert Review Tuesday 8th and Wednesday 9th July

It truly was a great two nights for the music department at Davenant. The summer concerts were packed with musical talent, brilliant conducting, and smooth stage movements from the stage crew.

On Tuesday we started strong with the orchestra, which set an exciting tone for the night. They performed 'The Best of the Beatles', an assortment of 'The Beatles' hits arranged by Custer which was conducted by . Mrs Tubb. Next up was the Senior Girls' Choir with a touching rendition of 'Pie Jesu', the Latin repetitive chant composed by Lloyd Webber. Mrs Flanagan led this ensemble, who also performed another moving choral song, 'Hallelujah' by Leonard Cohen, on Wednesday night. Mr Tubb superbly led the Brass ensemble with their take on the jazzy classic 'I got Rhythm' by George Gershwin, it was performed with snappy precision and an exciting pace.

This was followed by a solo by the brilliant G. Koskinas, who sang "If I Can't Love Her" from the 'Beauty and The Beast' musical in which he played the Beast back in March. The String ensemble followed, they gave us a great performance of 'Zadok the Priest' a song used in coronations but more well known for its inspiration of the Champions League Anthem. Mrs Tubb decided to go for a more modern sound the following night when they played the famous 'Viva la Vida'. A. Osborn also sang a stunning solo 'Meadowlark' from *The Baker's Wife* by Stephen Shwartz.

After this ensued Davenant's very own barbershop choir. Made up of 6 year 13 boys, they performed two well-known pop songs across the two nights, arranged in multi-layered harmony. They gave renditions of 'I want it that way', and the following night 'Teenage Dirtbag'. Then we had the pleasure of listening to Band 89, led by Mr Ball. This band of year 8s and 9s showed us their talent through two songs, 'Beaches' by Beadadoobee, and 'Notion' by the Rare Occasions. This band serves as a big inspiration for young students to get involved in music at Davenant. The first half was wrapped up by the School choir. Our large collection of students across all year groups in the school choir really epitomises the togetherness of the music community at Davenant. They performed two musical numbers, 'Speechless' from Aladdin, and 'Defying Gravity' from Wicked conducted by Mrs Tubb.

We were back with a bang in the second half with the Swing Band, with 'Soul Bossa Nova'. A rather exciting song performed expertly by Mr Williams and his band. They then took a more poignant and bluesy turn, with 'Cry me a River' by Arthur Hamilton. P. Watan and M. Bentley took the solos with class across the nights. A. Cheal took the reins the following night with a fan favourite, 'Our House'. The crowd even started to join in for this one! The Junior choir dialled the mood back to slow and heartfelt with 'My heart will go on', including solos truly felt with emotion. Mrs Flanagan does a great job of developing and inspiring young musical talent that we saw on stage.

Next was Sock Hospital, led by Mr Ball, with a smashing performance before most of their band members, J. Williams, O. Prosser, M. Johnstone and S. Marx leave. Sock Hospital performed "Driven to Tears' by The Police, and "Better Than Me' by the Brobecks. We are confident that the very talented P.de Sousa will carry on Sock Hospital's legacy, not only in Sock Hospital but many other bands. Mr Ball has been a great inspiration to us all - a real rockstar. The first night ended with a lot of fun and dancing with the year 7 medley. Their positive energy and radiant singing was tremendous and very uplifting. We look forward to seeing these promising students shine and take to the stage next year. On Wednesday, we had the privilege of seeing some additional acts. Kittun Asylum, the explosive maverick of a band, gave us renditions of 'Bobby Sox', and 'Welcome to the Black parade'. Mrs Santer, who runs this ensemble, blew us away on this one. We are very sad to see Daniel, the guitarist, leave but we are sure he will thrive in his engineering course.

The New Normal, a fabulous band made up of year 12s, performed 'Use Somebody' by Kings of Leon. It was a clean and impressive performance from them, as per usual. The concert band then wowed the audience with the John Williams Trilogy. Mr Tubb led the concert band which is always a highlight as it involves many of Davenant's most experienced performers. Bustacean performed Animals, by The Ghost of a Sabre Tooth Tiger. This is a very complex piece, performed by esteemed musicians and led by Mr Burns. It really put us both into a trance - great job guys. Fabric Four's fab performance demonstrated the intricacies of acid jazz. They are very lucky to have Mr Burns on keys and K. Baptiste on bass, who is sadly leaving. The eccentric Jonty performed his signature boogie woogie, playing 'Swanee River Boogie'. His flawless precision mixed with an effortless groove got the audience in a right jolly mood.

Mr Burns' stage crew ran the performances very slickly, thankfully giving us, as comperes, less time to say silly jokes! The stage manager D. Linnane and his team were incredibly helpful and well organised. M. Johnston, with the rest of the sound team, allowed us to appreciate the brilliant music. We owe a big thanks to E. Jowett and the lights department who were steadfast and great in their job.

On the Musical side, Mrs Tubb, Mr Tubb, Mrs Flanagan, Mr Ball, and Mr Williams put on a terrific show which I'm sure teachers, parents, and students alike are very thankful for. Students, there are so many musical opportunities for you to experience here at Davenant, and we really want to encourage you to immerse yourself and try something new! This team have won the District Cup at every age group since joining Davenant in year 7 but it is getting harder and harder each year. We are hoping that they can maintain their annual record by winning Year 10 next season — no pressure but high expectations!!!!

It was our turn to host Bradford Academy for the 4th year of the Diocese Cup, and a huge thanks to Theydon Bois Cricket Cup for allowing this fixture to take place at their Ground it was much appreciated. We are Diocese champions for the 4th consecutive year which is a massive achievement especially when considering the Davenant team was made up predominantly by year 9s supported by a couple of year 8s and even one year 7. We scored 196 for 3 after 20 overs while Bradford scored 99 for 7 after 20 overs. Well done boys a great achievement and even more pressure now for next year to retain the shield. After the fixture the two teams came back to School for a picnic outside Reception – this gave an opportunity for them all to find out more about each other and develop friendships. The social side of the occasion was further developed in the evening when both teams and teachers plus Mr Thorne visited RollerBowl for a competitive game of bowling (not sure who actually won this activity).

Outdoor Athletics

The first outdoor athletics event on the 30th April was the schools open cup organised and run by Chelmsford Sports & Athletics centre and Davenant use it as a warm up and an opportunity for Year 7 pupils to experience a large-scale event in preparation for the English schools Athletics Cup later in the term.

We took along 4 Year 7 teams, two boys and two girls, and two 8/9 combined teams, one boys and one girls. While the teams didn't win

their respective age groups there were some really notable performances. The Year 7 boys took first place in the 200 metres and Hurdles (A. Williams and M. Adams respectively), R. Anderson also won Year 7 girls hurdles event taking maximum points. The combined Year 8/9 boys team saw their highest achievements in the 100 metres where (D. Fairlamb) finished in 3rd place and A. Osagie came 1st in the 200 metres. The Year 8/9 combined girls team were placed highest finishing in 7th place overall; their best placed athletes were 3rd in 200 metres (Z.Griffith) and 4th in the High Jump (P.Whelan).

The participation in Chelmsford Schools Open definitely did its job in preparing the teams for the English Schools Athletics Cup first round and as all four teams (Junior Boys and Girls, Intermediate Boys and Girls) rose to the occasion and made finals. The Intermediate Boys and Girls and Junior Boys made the B final while the Junior girls went one better and qualified for the A final.

The three B finalist teams (Junior Boys, Intermediate Boys and Girls) were outstanding considering the adverse weather, strong winds and torrential rain, throughout the day of competition. The two boys teams finished in second place with scores of Junior Boys 401 and Intermediate boys 396 (missing out on first place by just a mere 3 points). Stand out performances from the Junior Boys has to go to N. Sandy who achieved 48 points on his own winning the 100 metres in 12.8 and the shot put 11.89 (half a metre further than his nearest rival). In the intermediate J. Prinsloo has to be mentioned for his total score of 36 points coming 1st place in the Javelin 36m and 2.23 for 800 metres. The Intermediate girls finished in 4th place with a score of 302, T. Akpoveta was stand out for her 35 total points earned from 13.6 in 100 metres and 1.32 High Jump.

Other notable achievements came from E. Amadou who achieved a total of 34 points for his good performances in 100 metres and triple jump where he finished second with 11.23m. Finally, a fantastic spectacle to see was A. Osagie taking the baton in the last leg of the 4 x 100 metre relay 25 metres behind the leading runner and managing to catch, and overtake, him to win the event – amazing!!!

The A finalist Girls Junior did themselves proud making it to such a high-level competition, however although they achieved their highest score yet reaching 401 points they finished in 11th place. Notable performances on the day came from Z. Griffith who obtained a total of 46 points for 200 metres; E. Dunnage 44 points for hurdles and shot; Z. Roman 39 points and I.Lester 38 points High Jump and 800 metres.



DISTRICT ATHLETICS

Congratulations Davenant Foundation School are now District Champions for the 9^{th} consecutive year. They won overall taking year 8, 9 and 10 age groups and coming 2^{nd} in year 7s – although we find it difficult to believe as 8 of our year 7 pupils have been selected to represent WESSA in the Essex County Championships this week.

All years won their mixed relay event, Year 10 finished 2nd. Notable performances by E.Amadou who broke the district record 12.20, triple jump, Year 7 girls were separated by a mere lean forward great race by M.King and SB Francis, Year 8 Gold medals for the 200 metres Z. Griffith for the girls and A. Mitchell Gold for the boys; Gold repeated again for the 200 metres Year 9 with A. Osagie for the boys and B. McClean for the girls, an additional Gold year 9 in the 300 metres H.Ansah for the girls and D. Fairlamb for the boys. The Year 10 students also brought back the golds F.Owers in 800 metres, J.Pownall-Jones High Jump and J.Prinsloo in the Javelin which he threw around 40 metres.


Other


















PE decided to offer an entire sports week this year to encourage mass participation and generate more house points and the events did their job as everyone played either dodgeball or rounders or both throughout the week, even those that normally sit out for PE – the school acknowledged this as a huge success. The points from the four days of dodgeball and rounders were carried over to start the fifth day of sports week which was then dedicated to the traditional Sports Day.

As usual, it was a highly competitive, frantic but spectacular day starting at 8.30am with the middle-distance races. Even missing the crowds at that time of the morning everyone could feel the thrill and excitement as the participants gave their all to gain valuable points for their respective Houses. The Field events also were performed without an audience, the only people attending being the participants, but this didn't distract from achievements and a new record was set in the Javelin at 44.6 metres by our very talented J. Prinsloo – the old record of 44.25 metres had stood since 2007.

Straight after a shortened lunch all the pupils were welcomed out to participate in, or support, the track events. The level of support could be heard around the entire school as the excitement rose especially in the sprint races; it must have been the immense level of noise that encouraged B. McClean to set a new record in the girl's Year 9 200 metres, which she won in a time of 27.21 beating the long-standing record of 27.5 set in 1997 – an amazing achievement well done. The relays, as always, were the highlight of the day and were as competitive as ever although the high temperatures did affect the times with them being considerably slower than those last year but each race was hugely competitive and hard fought right down to the line.

After calculating all the points, we were able to announce the winners of Sports Day for the fourth year running as being Whitechapel with a score of 702. Salisbury finished as runners up, 31 points behind Whitechapel, and Gillingham were in third spot just a mere 3 points behind Salisbury. Added to the Sports Day scores were the sports week points of Gillingham 83, Salisbury 132 and Whitechapel 135 (only three points between the runners up and winners of the dodgeball/rounders competitions) however these scores didn't affect the sports day outcome as Whitechapel increased their win overall by achieving 837 Salisbury 703 and Gillingham 651. Sports Day was another brilliant day of competition and a fitting end to a hugely success sports week, we are all looking forward to another hotly contested sports week in 2026.


Alice Abraham from UJS (Union of Jewish Students) ran a really informative session for our Year 12 Students on Preparing for University and Being Jewish on Campus.



Safeguarding - Latest Advice for Parents and Carers

The Safeguarding Team — Who we are

Davenant Foundation School's Safeguarding Team have been trained to an advanced level on all aspects of safeguarding. The team is available to any student, parent/carer or staff to discuss and report any safeguarding concerns:

The Safeguarding Team work closely with Heads of Years and Form Tutors to ensure the emotional wellbeing of our students is maintained. They manage and facilitate the mentors and counsellors who come into the school and who work so closely with our students.

Mental Health and Wellbeing

The mental health and wellbeing of our students is as important to us as their studies. Miss A Cooper is the Mental Health Lead of the School. We work closely with many mentoring and counselling providers and are fortunate to have mentors from Spark 2 Life come in to school two days a week to support our students. We also have a Counsellor and a Mental Health Practitioner from MIND in West Essex. Students in younger year groups can also get access to peer mentors, who are sixth form students willing to mentor and engage with our younger year groups.

The **School Nurse** provision is being bought back into school. We are fortunate to have a Child and Young Person Practitioner (CYYP) allocated to us who will visit the school weekly to hold drop in sessions and meet with students who have been referred to them. Please note this is not a replacement for the GP. The service will provide advice and guidance on a range of things such as anxiety, sleep hygiene, personal hygiene. Those students who are on the waiting list for CAMHS can also be referred. Please contact your Head of Year or the Safeguarding team if you would like your child to be referred to see the CYYP.

Kooth is an online mental health service that we will be promoting in assembly over the next few weeks. It is a free service commissioned by the NHS. We will be sending out a parent email with more information and a short parent video.


Prayer Letter
