






















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# **Creative Studies: Textiles**

# Davenant Spelling Bee

I recently wrote to KS3 parent and carers to let you know about an exciting new opportunity: an annual Davenant Spelling Bee! All students in Years 7-9 have been provided with a list of approximately 100 words and their definitions. I would like students to learn them, or as many of them as they can, in preparation for our competition in February.

The words have been chosen by our Heads of Department because they are relevant to their subject and important for students to know to secure success. In February, just before half term, students will be quizzed on a proportion of these words, and their definitions, in their English lessons. The most successful students will then be invited to take part in our inaugural Davenant Spelling Bee. Prizes and house points will be up for grabs at this competition.

Learning these words, and their definitions, will take a number of weeks and I have shared, on Talaxy, the Leitner method of using flashcards to assist in committing both words and definitions to memory. If your child would like any assistance in using this method, please ask them to come to see me and I will help them.

Please note that in some instances, I have **bolded** the part of the phrase, or definition, provided. This is to show that this is the part that needs to be learnt. As these words have been provided by various subject areas, it is important to note that the definition we require students to learn may be subject specific and not the commonly accepted definition for that particular word.



The best way for you, as parents/ carers, to support your young person with this task is to quiz them at home. Practice makes permanent, which is what we're aiming to do here: move those words into students' long-term memories, so that they still know them in many years to come!



### Prayer Letter: November to December 2023

#### The Servant of the LORD

"Here is my servant, whom I uphold, my chosen one in whom I delight;
I will put my Spirit on him, and he will bring justice to the nations.
He will not shout or cry out, or raise his voice in the streets.
A bruised reed he will not break, and a soldering wick he will not snuff out.
In faithfulness he will bring forth justice; he will not falter or be discouraged till he establishes justice on earth."

#### Isaiah 42:1-4

Here we see a prophecy of the coming of Jesus which is quoted again in Matthew 12 v 17-21. As we wait for the coming of Jesus Christ this Christmas, join me in first looking at how God describes Him and then how Simeon responds to His arrival. Let us pray out of these revelations.

### Jesus Presented in the Temple

Luke 2:29-32

"Sovereign Lord, as you have promised, you may now dismiss a your servant in peace. For my eyes have seen your salvation,

Let us Thank the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit for their plan of salvation. A plan decided before the world was created. Let us pray that as a community we will realise who our god is: God' the Fathers delight, the one the Father pours His Holy Spirit into. The Saviour of the world. Ask that the Holy Spirit will place a Simeon style expectancy and hope in each of us, and that the reality of the Saviours birth may be real in the students, the families, the staff, and the wider community.

Pray that this Christmas we will receive again the incarnate God in all His power and authority. which you have prepared in the sight of all nations:

As we see Jesus Christ for who He came to be and is, this Christmas let us join as a community making both room for His presence at Christmas but also in the coming year. Ask that not only the Davenant community will see Him in His glory but also that all the nations will recognise Him particularly those in conflict, wars and distress. Let us pray for the Middle East, Israel, Palestine and Ukraine that they may know the intervention of the Almighty God. Pray that Christ will touch those who feel at 'breaking' point. Those families in our community who need physical healing, emotional healing and restoration to relationships. Ask for those who are struggling financially and may be out of work that He will meet their needs and their hope will not be 'snuffed' out.

Pray for our communities that students will be safe and be protected on the streets and transport.

Pray that Christ's protection will envelop each of our families and extended communities that we will know God's justice and peace this Christmas time.

Just as Simeon remained faithful and hope filled, pray that as we experience the pressures of life that as a community we will see and know the fullness of our God. Experiencing him in the joy of Christmas and rest in His gifts and promises to never leave us nor forsake us. May we all receive a revelation of the power and majesty of our God 'For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given and the government shall be upon His shoulders and He will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father and Prince of Peace.'
